

Earn an AKC title in Rally Novice

What is Rally? It is a team sport of obedience with voice and/or hand signals allowed.

Unlike traditional obedience, which is called by the judge and where only minimal signals are allowed, Rally novice has a course of 10 - 15 signs, chosen out of 42 possible signs, and communication from the handler to the dog is encouraged. The AKC web site (<u>https://www.akc.org/sports/rally/</u>) shows the 42 signs and there are links to videos of how to perform each of them. The rules and regulations are also posted there.

For a novice title, it is now possible to set up one of their courses, perform it, video it and send it in along with an application and fee. With 3 qualifying scores comes a title. This program will run until December of 2020.

RALLY! (continued)

Rally has been taught at WKC since the old training center opened. Countless titles have been earned: novice, advanced, excellent and masters, by many breeds of WKC dogs. It does take some fun training time to show nice heeling on a loose lead, ready sits and downs, change of pace and changes of direction. The signs become more challenging as the levels progress and the dogs perform off lead. Paul Wickline has put Rally titles on 4 Scotties including 1 advanced and 1 excellent. So yes, any sound dog may participate. Carla Slabaugh had to wait for Cherry to become 6 months to earn her Virtual Rally Novice title last week.

Before "stay at home," WKC was teaching 3 classes weekly. I started teaching Rally probably about 2003 (?) with Maggie Susman. Soon thereafter Vicki Hobbs came on board as the small dog expert and she has always been the Problem Solver. First comes the mastering of the exercises, then putting them together on a course. The judges are looking for smooth teamwork. No tight leads, no leading the dog around, no luring and no intimidation.

The hardest sign to teach is a 180 degree pivot to the left in advanced. Small dogs get it faster than large dogs! So saying, one of Pat Vetter's Irish Wolfhounds was spot on.

My favorite thing is students succeeding. Becoming in tune with their dogs. Smiling faces and wagging tails. Earning titles. Even if people choose not to compete. Bonds are formed.

Vicki's greatest joys: Seeing dogs focus in on owners and the light bulb moments of "got it". Solving the puzzles of what works with different dogs. One of the best teacher rewards is when a doggy mom after taking her dogs through rally says that her entire relationship with her dogs has changed to a completely different and more personal relationship.

WKC Building Report COVID-19 impacts WKC Building Progress



The impact of COVID-19 is very evident in the progress of the final stages of the required landscaping for fulfilling our temporary occupancy permit. The final grading/fence /irrigation location looks different in "real life" rather than the flat page of the initial planning, so the landscape plan for the south side of the property was resubmitted to the city for approval. With the City of East Wenatchee offices closed and employees working from home, we are still awaiting final approval of the revised plan (as of the time of writing this) for all the final plantings to proceed.

To accommodate the delay, the city extended our temporary occupancy permit until July 30.

Hopefully we will have approval by the time you read this article and we can proceed to planting! The final installation of the fence along the south side is also on hold due to COVID-19. The City is proposing that the City Planning Commission approve a building code change to allow 6' fences setback 5' from commercial property boundaries. The current code requires a 10' setback for a 6' fence. The March and April commission meeting were cancelled with no meetings rescheduled at the moment.

AND the final planning and design of the complete outdoor area of the WKC Training Center is on hold until we can meet together (post COVID-19) and discuss what we need and want to have outside. As you

recall, we spent time as a club discussing and prioritizing what we wanted for the building itself. We need to do the same sort of process for the outdoors.

To facilitate the beginning of this process, the approximate corners of "Phase 2" of the building are marked on the east side (per the original plan of the building). The approximate location of a 100 × 100 foot training area is also marked on the east side. **These locations are not final**, but are intended to give some visual perspective to the area. A potential training area is marked on the west side, too. Each wooden stake will have a sign with what is marked.

Until we can meet as a group, you are encouraged to stop by any time and walk the grounds to get a feel for the relative sizes of the areas, then begin to think and dream about what you'd like the outdoor areas to look like and include.

Some ideas to get your creative thoughts going might be: How big do we need the outdoor training "rings" given how they "fit" into the space we have; how should they be positioned; what do we want to define the "rings" - permanent fencing, temporary fencing, a combination; what do we need outside the rings for classes - temporary canopies for shade, a permanent shade structure, both; storage building (s); picnic table(s); trees (where); do we want grass everywhere else or other landscaping - rock, bark, bushes; do we need to designate areas specifically for Scent Work or Barn Hunt; dog potty areas - where, permanent fencing, grass, bark, gravel; signage for the various areas; maintenance considerations; irrigation considerations - type of turf sprinklers (size of head at ground level), other water availability; a designated off-leash area; location of a fence from the east and west sides of the property to the building; what type of fence for that front facing the parking lot; access gates for vehicles; access from the building to the upper east end - gentle slope, steps, designated walkway; on the bank - grass, shrubs, or other; gating/security/access to the outdoor areas; club trailer parking; maintenance - mowing, irrigation, weeding, etc.; what might we want if we hold any events outdoors; etc.

The lack of class revenue the past two sessions has impacted the club's finances, and the budget for completing the outdoor training areas. The Board has directed the Building Committee to minimize any expenditures not needed to complete the required landscaping and to focus on the planning, design and budgeting for the outdoor training areas. Completion of those areas will be contingent on the club's overall financial status.

Now it's up to you. We have time between now and when COVID-19 allows us to reconnect in person to dream about the outdoors. If you have any questions about what is happening outdoors, please contact John Njus or Chuck St. John. They'll be glad to meet and give walking tours of the outside.

WKC Members' News and Brags



Jan Flatten: Team Flatten Aussies have been having a lot of fun training and trialing this past month thanks to both WKC instructors offering trick dog test evaluations and NADAC offering video runs. Proving once again that old dogs can learn new tricks, almost 13-year-old Cody passed his trick dog intermediate test and 10-year-old Ginger passed her trick dog advanced test (shown at left doing moving leg weaves), earning those titles pending AKC approval.

New kid on the block Aspen earned her Introduction to Novice Jumpers title from NADAC and already has two Qs toward her Novice title in the same. 10-year-old Brandi earned both her Open and Elite Jumpers NADAC titles and Ginger

earned her Open jumpers title. Brandi also earned her Novice Touch and Go and Open Regular NADAC titles.

Doing these video runs takes a lot of time and discipline. Setting courses correctly by yourself is time consuming and you may only submit your FIRST two runs per dog for each course, although you can certainly return to the course and practice, but not count, them. In addition to running the courses correctly, you must video you and your dog coming to the start line and leaving on leash, with no collars, food or toys allowed. We burned through all the available courses that would fit my yard and equipment availability to achieve this (i.e. lots of NQs, particularly with Aspen!). It doesn't help matters when the dog next door comes rushing over - NQs on all of those! Can't wait for the next courses to come out! Add to this starting the WKC online scentwork class and we are staying busy!

Wanda Cottam: Maako got his Intermediate, Advanced and Performer Trick Dog Titles this month! I am so proud of this little man!

Maggy Susman: Hermione and I have earned two legs towards our Intro Weaver's title and one leg towards our Intro Standard Novice title, from NADAC.

Gail Roberts: Pakuk (Siberian Husky) earned his Intermediate AND Advanced Trick Dog titles! This continues to be a lot of fun and I encourage our members to participate!
