Woo Hoo!!! We are just about to exit the "construction" phase of our building project and enter the longer term "maintenance" phase of building and property ownership!

In the meantime, a small challenge for ALL of us. It's pretty simple... "If you see a weed, pull a weed!" It's really pretty self-explanatory. Just like at home, if you see a weed poking up where you don't want it, most likely you'll bend over and pull it up or come back later and dig it up.

The same principle applies at the club...if you see a weed poking up where you KNOW it doesn't belong, feel free to pull it up. You can either leave it where you pulled it, or put it in the gray garbage tote by the side door, or take it home if you collect weeds \bigcirc .

We love eager volunteers! So don't' feel like you need to wait for an organized work day or an invitation to a weed pulling party, just dig in if you feel the need. But also don't feel like you need to do it all at one time either!

Thanks for all everyone does!

And a gentle reminder. Stay out of the east side of the building while the landscapers are installing irrigation, spreading dirt, and soon laying sod. Not only can you disrupt their hard work, it can be hazardous walking our dogs up there, and we and our dogs get dirty and track it inside...making more work for our cleaning crew. Thanks for your patience while we get that part finished. It will be worth the wait!

We are having our meeting this month on June 29th at 7:00 pm at the training center - bring your lawn chair (in case we go over 32 people) and join us. There will be a program this month - Erin Andersen will present a talk on "Water Rescue Dogs." Starting in July we will be meeting on the last Sunday of the month at 7:00pm.
