

This year, the club had runs in all 4 elements (Buried, Containers, Exterior, and Interior), each at 4 different levels (Novice, Advanced, Excellent, and Masters), on three days (Sept. 24,25,26). Thank you to the Trial Chair (Mike Barclay), the Trial Secretary (Janice Barclay), the other event committee members (Marcia Greenwood, Linda Harbury, and Betsy Metcalf), the judges (Victoria Lovejoy and Diane Porter). And special thanks to all the wonderful people who volunteered during the event, setting up beforehand and taking down, acting as timers or gate stewards, changing containers and furniture and walls during each day, and just generally making the event run super smooth all weekend!

This year, the Club is planning to hold the annual meeting on January 29, 2022 (subject to any subsequent regulatory changes) and will hold the election for Club offices at that meeting. The offices up for election this year are: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and one Director (one director is elected each year).

WKC Ag Dogs

The WKC Agricultural Detection Dog project is one of 13 projects invited by the Washington Tree Fruit Research Commission to submit a proposal for funding in 2022. (Of course the proposal is due October 18th, the day after WKC Agility trials!) The Cherry Research Committee is particularly excited about this WKC project which trains "companion dogs" to identify Little Cherry Disease. Trained LCD detection dogs could provide an economic and efficient early detection tool for the cherry industry's battle with a disease of pandemic proportion. Last year (2020) the USDA funded research using purpose-bred professionally handled dogs to detect Citrus Greening, a disease decimating the California and Florida citrus industry. Researchers discovered trained detection dogs could locate the disease in live plants with above 99% accuracy!

WKC Ag Dog classes are on-going. Class has been split into two groups with advanced dogs working outside, identifying LCD infected samples of cherry plant materials in a variety of containers. Recently the dogs detected samples placed in 5-gallon cans of dirt. Detection proficiencies are continuing to increase since evaluation by Dr. Nathan Hall, director of the Canine Olfaction Lab at Texas Tech University in August. The "newbies" (skilled scent work dog/handler teams just now adding LCD detection to their dogs' repertoire) are working indoors, learning to detect the target scent of cherry wood samples (positive/negative/empty) placed in jars held by flat boxes. The number of boxes and arrangement is changed for each run.

Judy and Tara had fun and Qs in hurdles. Katie and Judy had a qualifying score for team competition. Judy and Tara had another fun run in teams. Judy and Shelby came home with their RATCHX ribbon as well as qualifying ribbons in 2 days of competition. Tara, Linda, Katie and Frank all received qualifying ribbons in their Masters competitions. Great results for all.



The Flatten girls (Aussies) have had a busy month! Ginger and Aspen were in the WKC Scent Work trial last month and Ginger earned her Masters Containers Title! At the Puyallup trial in July I had no intention of entering Masters with Ginger, but Aspen moved up to Excellent so it was forced, and Ginger rocked Excellent, 3 for 3 between 2 runs in Puyallup and her WKC run. Aspen earned her Excellent Containers title at WKC and that allowed me to switch dogs, with Aspen in Masters (she Qd!) and Ginger in Excellent





Elite. Aspen also earned her Advanced Exterior Title (3 for 3 at WKC). A few other Qs and placements made for a nice weekend. This weekend all three girlies ran in the WKC agility trial, in what will likely be all of their last trials. Brandi (above) earned two 10 point (1st place) Qs in T2B and a 4th place in JWW, Aspen (at left) earned a 1st place Q in open Standard, and Ginger had fun running perfectly for exhibition only in FAST and T2B at 8". She bounced around the course wagging her little flag tail happily. Aspen also earned her Elite Jumpers title virtually at home.



Shanna Davies: Ethel Grace and Scrappy did the scent work trials in Cashmere, WA. Ethel Grace (above left) got two qualifying runs: one Q in novice exterior and one Q in advanced containers. Scrappy (above right) went to his very first scent work trials. He got three qualifying runs. Scrappy got his very first title and second placement ribbon for novice interior. He also did novice containers where he got two qualifying runs. This was my first trial running both dogs.

Suzanne Metcalf: In the Wenatchee Kennel Club Agility, Astrid Q'd in FAST to earn her Novice preferred FAST title.

Tara Barrett: Had a month of fun weekends. At the WKC Scent Work Trial, Otter finally finished her Buried Advanced title to complete her overall Advanced title, picked up a Q in Containers Excellent, and got her first two Qs in the Master level of scent work, both in Exteriors.

I'd somehow forgotten that at our last Barn Hunt trial in 2019,

Otter had developed a fear of tunnels (Otter: "Tunnels dark! Scary!"). It quickly became apparent that during the two intervening years without trials, Otter had clearly not forgotten anything (Otter: "Still dark! Still scary!"). So we had no Qs - not a single one in the whole weekend!

So on the weekend following the WKC scent work trials, we went to a "Tunnel Clinic" at Argus, taught by Barb Kraus. She started the dogs on a small two leg tunnel, and gradually had us work up to a five (!) leg tunnel. For each tunnel, we met the dogs at the exit with immediate rewards - toys or treats or a tube with a rat, depending on each dog's preference. Apparently tunnels appear far less dark and scary when there is a delicious treat waiting at the end (Otter: "Yum!").

The weekend after that, we went to Argus for the 2021 Barn Hunt Regionals. Our first search for rats was a team hunt, and Otter was paired up with Shelby. For team hunt, right before you enter the ring, you draw a token from a bowl to determine which dog does the tunnel and which dog does the climb. I was hoping very much that Otter would draw the climb, because I wasn't sure she had entirely gotten over her tunnel phobia. But as luck would have it, Otter drew the tunnel. So we went in the ring, released the dogs, and started the hunt. Both dogs quickly found a rat - 2 down and 4 rats to go. I tried sending Otter to the tunnel, holding my breath as she disappeared into the entrance. "Tunnel!" cried our judge, as she exited the other end. "Hooray! Good Dog, Otter!" Back to the search - still more rats to find. But wait, where was Otter? "Tunnel 2!" said the judge with a smile, as Otter exited from the tunnel, having decided to do it a second time. Otter looked at me, a little puzzled that her treat had not appeared. "Find rats!" I said, trying to gesture her toward the maze of hay bales, and she did indeed find another rat. But then "Tunnel 3," said the Inside

Rat Wrangler, quietly, laughing, as Otter did the tunnel yet again. Well, I lost count at some point, but I think Otter did the tunnel five or six times in total, and although between them Shelby and Otter found five rats, we ran out of time before the sixth rat was sniffed out, so no Q. Fortunately, on the following days Otter was still happy to do tunnels when I asked her to, but she gave up on repeating tunnels in search of those elusive treats. And we got our very first Barn Hunt Qs at the Masters level, both third places!
