Healthy and Happy Holidays

Keeping Our Furry Friends Safe



Our dogs are often an essential part of our holiday celebrations, but it can be a stressful time for them too. You probably already know most of the foods that are fine for people but dangerous for dogs: chocolate, grapes, raisons, onions, and bones. But do your holiday guests know them?

A few years ago my cousin was not thrilled to find that Otter had snuck into the room she was staying in, unzipped her suitcase, and helped herself to a bag of macademia nuts. But that quickly changed to worry after finding out macadamias could be poisonous to dogs, and we spent an unhappy hour on the phone with the vet and then the poison center, trying to figure out how much Otter had eaten relative to her body weight.

Whose fault was it? Mine! Mine for forgetting that my cousin had never owned a dog and could not be expected to know about either the extreme resourcefulness of a certain hungry yellow lab, or the foods that could be toxic to her.

It's a little embarrassing to have to start out family visits with instructions to keep doors closed and food items at least 6 feet off the floor, but it's far better than having a sick pet. Although, I have to say, my embarrassment is sometimes mixed with a little reluctant pride at just how adept my dogs are with zippers, latches, and opening doors, drawers, and cabinets. And just how good their noses are at sniffing out what interests them. Those macademia nuts were upstairs, inside a room with a closed door, wrapped in plastic, secured deep in a zippered suitcase. And we had left the house for no more than an hour. Aren't dogs amazing?

Other holiday hazards include Christmas plants: poinsettas, holly, mistletoe, ivy, and Christmas trees can all create digestive upset.

One growing threat is the increasing use of xylitol in a variety of products, including sugar free candy, chewing gum, mouthwash, toothpaste, breath mints, some baked goods, cough syrup, chewable vitamins, some peanut and nut butters, sugar free desserts including 'skinny' ice cream, and dietary supplements. It's also known as birch sugar. Even a very small amount can cause liver damage or death for canines. Symptoms include decreased activity, weakness, staggering, incoordination, collapse and seizures – if you think your dog has eaten xylitol, take them to a vet immediately. So check labels – I was dismayed to find it in my favorite toothpaste, and since I don't trust myself to remember to lock it up after every use, I ended up switching to another brand.

My cousin and her husband will be visiting for Christmas this year, and unfortunately now that "welcome, welcome, welcome" speech is also going to have to include some discussion about what types of products could contain xylitol and making sure they are included in the "at least 6 feet off the ground" rule. If the ubiquity of xylitol in common household products continues, I think I may have to add a little safe to the guestroom, like the ones you find sometimes in hotels. I think that would defeat even Otter's ingenuity, although with Iskie, I'd probably also have to explain that it would be best not to say the combination to the safe out loud or open it in her view.

WKC AGRICULTURAL DETECTION DOGS

Remembering Mike Barclay, our friend, enthusiastic supporter and co-instructor of the WKC Agricultural Detection Dog program, participants continue training the detection skills required to identify Little Cherry Disease in nursery and orchard settings.

The Ag Dog project is developing next-step protocols for transition into field experiences. Training aid delivery devices (TADDs) developed with space age technology will be used for the introduction of cherry tree root and bark samples and assist with transfer of detection skills to field settings.

The eight Ag Dog teams look forward to testing their LCD detection skills at fruit tree nurseries and in orchards early next year. The dogs will check four separate environments: trees in storage, rootstock stool beds, fields of nursery stock, and cherry scion orchards.

The WKC goal is to demonstrate the benefit of trained LCD detection dogs as early detection tools in the control and eradication of Little Cherry Disease.
