One word is rarely sufficient to describe a person but many who have shared a chapter of life with Lynda T. Pheasant might offer vivacious, mentor, creative, inquisitive, tenacious, connector, storyteller, advocate, philanthropist, or memory-holder. Our family would additionally honor her with wife, mother, grandmother, supporter, and cheerleader. Lynda and her husband Jack recently celebrated 61 years of marriage.

A resident of East Wenatchee for the past 52 years, Lynda and Jack raised 3 children in the valley while advocating for the agriculture industry, encouraging life-long learning, and providing influential leadership within a breadth of community programs.

During the past 20 years, Lynda teamed with her two Australian shepherds to earn numerous titles in Agility, Rally, Scentwork, Tricks, and Barn Hunt. Lynda and Awesome Annie were the first team in NCW to achieve the MACH (Master Agility Champion) title. Most recently, Lynda leveraged her love of dogs with her experience in the tree fruit industry to develop an Ag Detection Dog program whereby orchardists/community members team with their dogs to detect Little Cherry Disease; the research component being grant funded by the Washington Tree Fruit Research Commission (perhaps their first project awarded to an octogenarian!).

Some people say life is the dash between dates. For Lynda, life was the connections and relationships she cultivated with family, friends, and community over a lifetime. Family includes her husband, Jack Pheasant; children Dr. Susan Pheasant, Jean & Brian Stearns, and Col. David & Kristin Pheasant; and granddaughters Audrey Stearns & Samantha Stearns. Lynda was preceded in death by her parents, Allen & Audrey Taylor, and her brother Keith.

Lynda celebrated life every day. History of Obedience

AKC Obedience Trials owe their existence to a pioneer in the sport of purebred dogs, Mrs. Helen Whitehouse Walker. Helen was a breeder of Standard Poodles and the dogs of her Carillon Kennels were quickly gaining recognition as dogs with outstanding quality and character. Like many Poodle breeders, Helen had to fight the stereotype that Poodles were nothing more than just a fancy haircut. To combat this image and to convince others that Poodles were as smart as any other breed, she devised a series of exercises to showcase their intelligence.

She borrowed the idea from England's sponsorship of the Associated Sheep, Police, Army Dog Society. This English Society had developed competitive tests, which were open to all breeds of dogs. Mrs. Walker approached dog clubs and private kennel owners with her idea of holding competitive tests in conjunction with dog shows in the area. With months of hard work and perseverance in October of 1933, the first Obedience Trial (then called "test") was held on her father's estate in Mt. Kisco, NY. There were eight dogs entered in this first obedience test, two Labrador Retrievers, three Poodles, two English Springer Spaniels, and one German Shepherd Dog. The winner of this event was a Labrador Retriever owned by William F. Hutchison of Far Hills, NJ.

The enthusiasm for this new event spread quickly and Mrs. Walker scrambled to organize a second test to be held in conjunction with the North Westchester Kennel Club show in June of 1934. She sent a letter to the American Kennel Gazette (AKC's official publication)

Test classes could become popular-not only to prove the value of developing a dog's brain, but also in interesting the average visiting public at a show. The judging of dogs in the breed classes is a mystery to many, but a series of tests displaying the dog's brain is something they can actually see.

At that time there was only one obedience class. The exercises included heeling on-leash and offleash, sitting for two minutes and lying down for five minutes while the owner went out of sight, a drop on recall (the dog is called to the handler and is commanded to lie down when it is half way to the handler and then is signaled to come and sit in front of the handler) retrieving a 2 lb. dumbbell (regardless of breed size) and retrieving another slightly lighter dumbbell over a 42" jump (regardless of breed size).

Mrs. Walker emphasized the importance of dog owners to develop a deeper relationship with their dogs. She encouraged amateurs to participate in obedience tests and stressed accuracy and precision in performance while the dog demonstrated enjoyment and willingness to work. She submitted the first set of guidelines and procedures for obedience tests to the American Kennel Club for consideration on December 7th, 1935. On March 10th, 1936 The American Kennel Club approved the first set of regulations titled *Regulations and Standards for Obedience Test Field Trials*.

Obedience tests were then divided into the three classes we know today, Novice, Open and Utility. The exercises have not been altered that much over time; however any dog that earned a Utility title had to also pass a tracking test to achieve the UD title.

The regulations have expanded to facilitate the sport of obedience to grow and flourish, but the core values that Helen Whitehouse Walker strove to instill in obedience competitors are still with us today. Almost all dogs entered in an obedience trial have been trained and are handled by their owner. Obedience dogs are true family companions that share their lives with the people who showcase their skills in a competitive arena. AKC obedience is open to anyone who is interested in developing a meaningful relationship with their dog based on communication and fun!



WKC Dogs Get Very Tricky!

Eight dog and handler teams successfully completed the WKC Tricks class this session. Teachers were Linda Hessel with assistant Karen Haase. Teams worked on 10-25 different tricks both with and without props.

Linda reports: All teams are super enthusiastic and entertaining and we cheered a lot as each dog solved new behavior "puzzles." The dogs were happy practicing in class—it's low stress— and really engaged while performing a variety of new, silly behaviors (ie, stunts/tricks!).

Jan Flatten: I never thought it would be possible, but Aspen earned her Excellent Jumps with Weaves title last month. Aspen has always been a low drive dog, who is very environmentally sensitive, and after her first couple trials I wasn't sure she could compete in a high stress environment. Then cancer struck and we stopped trialing for a year which included



chemo. Last fall I decided to give it another chance, and she earned her Open titles at the WKC trial in the fall. Two more trials since then she has now earned her Excellent JWW title! I'm so proud of her! Although we know her time with us is more limiting than must dogs since all we can hope for is a long remission, she is living a full life. She showed a lot of environmental sensitivity at Fun Fur Paws (barking dogs), but hopefully she will feel more comfortable at Moses Lake.

Sara Elzey, Pam Jenkins, and Tara Barrett: WKC has three teams participating in AKC's Winter Agility League, and all three moved up a little in the rankings for Round 2 (Jan. 30-Feb. 12). Q Seekers (Seniors) placed 14 out of 40 teams nationally and 2nd in the Northwest region. Darby was our highest individual placement - 3rd out of 38 dogs in the 16" preferred class. Rugged Runners (Sophomores) was at 10 out of 19 teams nationally and 1st in the Northwest region. Austin was our highest individual placement - 7th out of 24 dogs in the 16" preferred class. Cascadian Coursers (Freshman) placed 5th out of 22 teams nationally and 1st in the Northwest region. Luna was our highest individual placement - 2nd out of 10 dogs in the 20" preferred class. And the most exciting Agility League news: Aspen, Jan and Brad Flatten's beloved Aussie, was featured in the League Spotlight on February 5th.
